## Another Great Year for a Yard Sale!

Thanks to All from the Yard Sale Committee – Andrew Kerstetter, Katrina Wieand and Pat Mabus

Wow! We did it again! Another absolutely AMAZING Yard Sale!

Due to the generosity of the many donors, shoppers and volunteers we netted \$4,133.65!

Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

We had everything from an apple corer to a zipper...items big and small...from antique furniture to tatted doilies...we had it. And you either gave it or bought it! Whether it was one item, or one box, or one truck load (yes, we received multiple truckloads of donations) – it all added up to one INCREDIBLE Yard Sale!

So, this is how we get there...we start collecting for the following year in September. Items are stored in the basement of the Museum and Katrina and Pat start pricing and organizing. Furniture and bulky items are stored off site in one of our member's garages (at no cost to us). Volunteers donate their time and trucks to pick up and relocate these treasures. This goes on for 9 months...donations come in, get priced, organized and relocated as necessary...wash, rinse, repeat...you get the picture.

Then the week before the Yard Sale, it is ALL hands on deck. While the Museum is closed, items are brought up from the basement for staging to the outside. Andrew co-ordinates volunteers and their trucks to collect tables and saw horses, which will be loaned to us for the Sale, as well as the furniture that has been stored off site. The day before the Sale; the tables are put out, the basement is completely emptied and many items are actually placed on the tables for the next day's Sale. We hire an EPD officer to patrol our property from 9PM Friday to 5AM Saturday when the team arrives to complete the final set up.

During the Sale, volunteers are assisting shoppers, negotiating deals and loading vehicles with purchases – all while enjoying the robust community spirit. Our Hospitality Committee nurtures us with a hearty breakfast and refreshing lunch – keeping us energized to get through the day. At 4PM we start packing up. All unsold items are moved to the garage. Monday at 9AM, the team returns with their pickup trucks, which are then loaded for donation to Goodwill. And we are finished... until September when we will start all over again...wash, rinse, repeat...

We will start collecting your treasures, for the June 3, 2023 Sale, in September, after Labor Day. Please keep in mind that we DO NOT take clothing and upholstered furniture. Unfortunately, we can no longer accept electronics (TVS, VCRs, computers, etc.) nor baby items (Hi-chairs, walkers, strollers, bouncy seats, etc.) as Goodwill does not accept them.

## Recent Acquisitions

The Emmaus Historical Society would like to thank the family of Dr. Harvey Tilghman Wickert, the Emmaus family doctor who practiced in the Borough from 1896 to 1938, for the beautiful family photo album with photos dating back to a baby picture of the doctor, tin types of the doctor and his wife, Ida Hillegas Wickert (married in 1880) as well as cabinet cards of his three daughters, Lillie, Florence and Viola. Dr. Wickert was born in 1855 and died in 1940. His office was located at 250 Main Street (now the Schantz Funeral Home) in Emmaus.

While in town, Dr. Wickert served one term on Borough council, and was elected burgess on two occasions, once in the 1900's and a second time in the 1930's. He donated the lighting and memorial fountain to Emaus WWI veterans when the Triangle was redone in 1923-1924. He also donated the military monument to the Emaus veterans of the Civil and Spanish American Wars and WWI on the Memorial Triangle in 1930.

Clarence Keck who was also involved with the Telephone Company as Treasurer, as well as with the Yeager Furniture Company of Allentown. Their daughter, Annetta Keck, would later marry Horace Schantz.

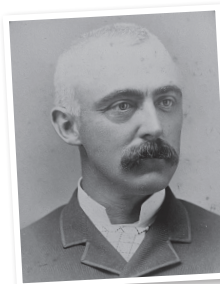

## *From our Readers – Correspondence Received on the May 2021 Newsletter Article, Two Iconic Businesses Celebrating 75 Years*

### **324 Main Street - 122 Years Later**

#### **A Note from Harriet Bachman White**

As I was leafing through an old Emmaus Historical Society Newsletter from May of 2021, I noticed an article titled “Two Iconic Emmaus Stores Reach Milestone Anniversary”. That’s what gave me the idea to send this story of my grandfather, Dr. Charles A. Bachman, who started practicing dentistry in 1900 and opened his practice on the side of his home at 324 Main Street, just up the street from what is now the Emmaus Historical Society. He and my grandmother raised 5 children there and lived at 324 Main Street the rest of their lives.



Dr. Bachman was a member of the Emmaus Borough Council for 4 years and 2 years served as president. He was a charter member and director of the Emmaus Building and Loan Association, President for many years and Vice President later. He also served a term on the Emmaus school board, was a director of the First National Bank for many years and director in the Community Nurses Association for 3 years.

He was a charter member of the Rotary Club of Emmaus and a Life Member of the Emmaus Fire Company #1. When the anniversary of the Golden Jubilee of the Borough of Emmaus was observed in 1909, he was Chairman

of the Ways and Means Committee and a committee member when the Diamond Jubilee was celebrated in 1934. He was a trustee of Kutztown State College for 20 years and was the first president of the Mercantile Club of Emmaus.

My grandfather was an Elder for 26 years and a treasurer for 12 years in the Evangelical Reformed Church of Emmaus. When the new church was built in 1922, he was on the Building Committee and in 1923, a temporary trustee of the church school. He also served on church committees for fund-raising, building programs and dedication of the new church in 1924.

In 1959, Dr. Bachman was the oldest practicing dentist in Emmaus and one of the oldest in Lehigh County. That year, four years before his death, he was honored at a testimonial dinner where he received awards and plaudits from the Lehigh Valley Dental Association and the American Dental Association for his almost 60 years of service as a dentist in Emmaus. It’s amazing how he was able to serve his community in so many ways.

But that’s not the end to his story. It has been 59 years since his passing, yet a dental practice that he started in 1900 still remains there today, 122 years later. Since my grandfather’s death, Dr. John Schevets, Dr. William Wertz, and Dr. Daniel Keating have occupied that same space with their practices at 324 Main Street, right off the Triangle in Emmaus. Poppop would have been so proud! ☺

## *From our Readers – Correspondence Received on the February 2021 Newsletter Article, “Photographs and Memories”*

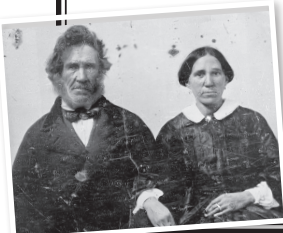
### **A Note from Marilyn Harris**

I enjoy each newsletter and especially the February 2021 issue’s article on Photographs and Memories. I was born and lived the first 18 years of my life in Emmaus. Your article on photographs and memories sent me to my ancestry of my mother’s family. Some years ago, a cousin and I explored the Ancestors of Benneville Fenstermaker Hertzog, our grandfather. We were able to trace to our 5th Great Grandparents in 1636.

My mother put names on many of the photographs I inherited when she died in 1988. I was fortunate to know all but one of my mother’s eight siblings and their families since four of them lived on N. 5th Street and another on S. 2nd Street in Emmaus and others nearby.

The earliest photo I found in my mother’s photos was of her grandparents, Levi Hertzog and Rebecca Fenstermacher. Fortunately, she had a note attached that read: “My grandparents”. I showed this photograph to a museum curator who told me it was an image on glass, an ambrotype. The curator referred me to a gallery to have it preserved. The soiled areas remain and it is matted and framed in a shadow box with conservation glass to preserve it.

My mother had a picture of her mother and father, Benneville and Alice Agnes Brown Hertzog. They married on March 10, 1888. My grandmother lived with my mother and father when they married in 1933 until her death in 1951. I was born I in 1936 and have



fond memories of her during my early years.

I never knew my grandfather, Benneville, who died before I was born. He was killed while he was “taking his usual after dinner walk along the tracks of the Reading Railroad, near Emaus”. It was thought that he moved over to the east bound tracks to avoid the freight train headed westward and was not aware of the New York Flyer approaching. He worked at the Donaldson Iron Works practically daily and was considered to be in “excellent health and remarkable agility” at the age of 75 due to his daily walks.

My mother and father, Florence Hilda Hertzog and Roger Stanley Dickert were married on April 22, 1933. My parents bought the house at 424 N. Fifth Street in Emmaus when they married in 1933.

I attended Lincoln and Central Schools and graduated from Emmaus High School in 1954. My husband who died in 2014, my parents and grandparents and other relatives are buried on Northwood Cemetery. My extended family, remaining cousins and their families live in Emmaus, Macungie, Northampton and Mertztown so I continue to enjoy my visit to Emmaus where we meet at the Trivet or Superior Restaurant or one of their homes. ☺
