## From our Readers – Letters Received on the November Newsletter Article "Remembering the Houseknechts"

#### A Note from Jim Sassaman, Class of 1956, EHS

The November newsletter article, "Emmaus Brothers in Sports: Earl Jr., Theodore and Roland" brought back a memory about "Rollie" Houseknecht. The Green Hornets were playing a home football game against Coach Andy Lehr's Nazareth team. Nazareth led 7-6 (missed an extra point) until Emmaus kicked a field goal to lead 9-7. Toward the end of the game, in an attempt to save time, some Nazareth players were "hurt"; after one particular plan, I recall two of them feigned injury at the same time.

Two things about this game: (1) Rollie kicked the field goal. In the early 50's, high school field goal kicking was not a common occurrence. (2) This game was Nazareth's first loss in over two years. Wow!

Rollie played football at Muhlenberg in the late fifties after serving in the military. S

#### A Note from Alan Musser

I'd like to provide a short addendum to the tribute to the Houseknecht brothers, Earl, Ted and Rollie by Mr. Knauss.

There was another skilled athlete in the family, their sister, Anne, Class of '53.

Anne was a member of the girls' basketball team for three years. She served as co-captain and was MVP her senior year.

Upon graduation, Anne enlisted in the USAF and took basic training at Lackland AFB, San Antonio. She received technical training as a radio operator at Keesler AFB in MS. While at Keesler, she participated in the intramural basketball league where she came to the attention of the coach of the USAF Women's National Basketball Team (competitively the forerunner to today's WNBA). The team toured the USA and the world competing and representing the USA as Good Will ambassadors.

Upon her discharge from the Air Force, she moved to Ohio, married and raised three children. Anne was a God-loving woman and was a friend to all who knew her. She passed away in 2014.

## Celebrating 275 Years Since the Founding of the Emmaus Moravian Church! A Capsule History of Emmaus From the 1959 Bicentennial Borough of Emmaus Walking Tour Brochure

Although William Penn and the Quakers settled Philadelphia and vicinity in the late 17th Century, the Europeans did not reach this area, then known as Maguntsche, until the fourth decade of the next century. The Settlers who finally came were thrifty Germans, fleeing war and seeking religious freedom.

The oldest building within the present boundary of Emmaus of which there is record is the "Zuflucht Haus" or "Shelter House", erected near the Indian Trail along the lower slopes of South Mountain in 1734. This building probably was a haven and shelter for early travelers and settlers.



Within the next few years, several log cabin homes were bult in the area. These early settlers probably reached Emmaus on the Indian Trail which followed Leibert's Creek through the South Mountain along the route of the Vera Cruz-Emmaus Road. After 1750, the Great Philadelphia Road followed this line.

In 1736, George Shoemaker took a warrant for 200 acres of land in the vicinity of the present Emmaus High School and eventually settled on it. John Henry Knauss located near Furnace Dam on a 1738 land warrant while Sebastian Knauss built his cabin near the railroad underpass on E. Main Street and Jacob Ehrenhardt erected his cabin on present day South Keystone Avenue.




It was to Ehrenhardt's cabin that the Moravian missionary and patron, Count Zinzendorf, came to preach in late 1741. This was followed by the erection of a community church (1742), opening of a Moravian boarding school (1746), founding of a Moravian congregation (1747) and finally the establishment of a closed Moravian Village or "Gemein Ortt" in 1758-59 on land donated to the community by Jacob Ehrenhardt and Sebastian Knauss. The first house in the new village, closed to all except members of the Brethren (Moravians) was of log on the site of 160 Main Street. It was built by Andreas Giering and was occupied in 1759. The little village, first called Salzburg (Salisbury), was given its present name of Emmaus by Bishop Spangenberg of the Moravian Church at a lovefeast on April 3, 1761.

Indian scares, common during the French and Indian War, faded with the defeat and departure of the French from North America after 1763. But the American Revolution brought new tribulations for the few residents of Emmaus. The Moravians were pacifists and for their refusal to fight or even to take an oath, were harassed, fined and even imprisoned at the gaol in East Towne (Easton). Among those jailed for a time were

the paster Forme (Easten), Frincing the paster, Franz Boehler and Andreas Giering, occupier of the first house in the village. Eventually, 12 members of the Emmaus Church enlisted in the Continental Army. They are all buried in God's Acre at the foot of South Third Street. Included in the group are Jacob Ehrenhardt, Jr., builder of the 1803 House; Henry Knauss who built another Emmaus house which still stands and Martin Leibert, whose son operated a



grist mill and gave his name to Leibert's Gap and Leibert's Creek.



The congregational village grew very slowly because young people left rather than endure the austere religious life. Intermarriage with boys and girls of Lutheran and Reformed faiths was frequent. The Emmaus Moravian Church rolls numbered only 131 in 1829 and during the next decade, Emmaus ceased to be a closed village as the Church Council began selling lots to non-Moravians.

Another sect, the United Evangelical, organized in 1839 and erected a church at Second and Ridge Street in 1845. This was the forerunner of the numerous churches in the Borough today.

In 1858, the railroad builders reached Emmaus and the first train passed in April, 1859. This same year, Emmaus, population now 277, organized into a borough and the first local officials were elected on October 31, 1859 at the Eagle Hotel, then occupying much of the Triangle.



Iron ore was mined in the area after 1850 and a blast furnace was finally "blown in" in 1869. Although several companies failed, foundries have been active in Emmaus from 1869 to the present. The largest iron-maker was the Donaldson Iron Company which made cast iron pipe and other products from 1882 to 1943.

From 1882 until recent times, the silk industry was a major factor in the Borough and buildings erected for silk mills still furnish space for manufacturers of such diverse products as swimsuits, cloth, underwear, electric light switches, heating units and chemicals.

Cigars, shoes, pajamas, roofing paper, boilers, dimmers, industrial gases, books, grinding balls, handbags, containers and magazines are among the diverse products which are, or have been. made in Emmaus.

The area of the "Gemein Ort" was about a hundred acres while the Borough as created in 1859 contained 200 acres. The boundary of the Borough remained unchanged from 1859 to 1903 as the population increased to 1,468 by 1900. An annexation of surrounding land in 1903 began the growth towards modern Emmaus. Another major annexation occurred in 1925 and numerous minor additions to the area of Emmaus have occurred in the intervening years. The present area of the Borough is more than thirty times that of the congregational Village and the population approaches 12,000.

A noticeable change in the content of Emmaus population occurred coincidental with the spread of the automobile and the development of good roads. Whereas in the last century, most people who lived in




Map of Emmaus Annexations

Emmaus worked in the community; today a large percentage of our population works in Allentown, Bethlehem and other communities as far away as Philadelphia. Thus, the newer sections of the town have developed as entirely residential areas. This has accounted for most of the growth of Emmaus population from 6,731 people in 1940 to the present 11,500 plus.

In recent years, Emmaus citizens and their government have exhibited much concern for the well-being of the community and have built or created our widely used public library, the welltrained and equipped volunteer fire department, the volunteer community ambulance service, the modern water works and distribution system, Emmaus Community Center, and other recreation and open-space areas, sanitary sewers, bi-weekly trash collection and numerous other services, both paid and volunteer.

The people of Emmaus have indicated by their actions their pride in this community which dates back more than two (now two and three quarter) centuries. That pride in the community and its heritage will, we believe, carry into the third century of America's independence and continue to keep this area a fine place in which to live. So







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
